Core Sound's celebration of Earth Day on Friday, April 8th and Saturday April 9th will highlight the magic of that life & the beauty and magic of the natural world around us.




On Friday, April 8th over 400 elementary school students

he Albemarle-Pamlico Estuarine System is composed of five major and three minor sounds. As we established last month, A.P. E.S is fed thousands of gallons of freshwater via six major river basins. These rivers originate on the land face of North Carolina / Virginia and flow into the sounds through the tidewater region. Those river basins are, north to south, the Pasquotank, Chowan, Roanoke, Tar-Pamlico, Neuse and White Oak.

"Cuts" in the Outer Banks known as inlets allow ocean water to enter the sounds. Those inlets, north to south, are Oregon, Hatteras, Ocracoke, Drum, Barden, Beaufort and Bogue. Freshwater (salinity 2+/- ppt) from the rivers mixes with ocean water (salinity 35+/- ppt) to create sound water of moderate salinity (20 +/- ppt). This mixed water of moderate salinity is referred to as "brackish" and is extremely important to commercial and recreational fishing, "wild-caught" seafood and a growing mariculture industry along North Carolina"s coast.

As an example, a 2021 study found that North Carolina's "wild-caught" seafood industry alone contributed nearly \$300 million in value to the state's economy and the industry supported over 5500 jobs. The majority of those jobs were located in the 20 counties making up a significant portion of the tidewater region and the coastal communities of the inner and outer banks.

The largest share of N.C. 's seafood industry originated in the waters of the Albemarle-Pamlico Estuarine System . It is well documented that this system represents what is termed as a major nursery for North Carolina's finfish and shellfish such as atlantic blue crab, shrimp, flounder, clam and oysters.




Core Sound Education Spotlight ~ Abbi Davis
